Opportunities for Parental Involvement (School Year 2009-10)

Dinner is served and activities which include school functions, program awareness and therapeutic activities are just some of the highlights. Parent forums are also held at family nights that allow parents to discuss concerns or needs with school administration.

In addition, Casa Pacifica holds monthly treatment team meetings to discuss progress and needs of individual students. Parents are invited and encouraged to attend so as to play an active role in their student's success. Parents are expected to be involved in all student IEP meetings as well.

Finally, all parents are encouraged to take an active role in their student's education and are welcome to volunteer either in the school or for the agency.

Casa Pacifica's overall facilities and its environmental conditions are modern, in peaceful harmony with the environment, and structurally sound. The school campus includes seven classrooms, a gymnasium, multi-purpose room, sensory room, pool area, softball field, outdoor basketball court, pond with surrounding walking path, canteen, medical clinic, conference room, vocational education area and the Education Office. The campus opened in 1993. Two groups of portable buildings were added to accommodate growing needs. No new structural additions are planned for the 2009-2010 school year.

Campus maintenance staff ensures that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good repair and working order are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used to ensure efficient service and that emergency repairs are given the highest priority. A custodial/housekeeping staff cleans school facilities daily. The principal works directly with the maintenance/housekeeping staff to ensure a clean, safe and pleasant environment for staff and students.

Casa Pacifica NPS – provides daily specialized academic instruction for Special Education students in grades 1-12. Casa Pacifica contracts with local school districts to provide these services to students who need a more restrictive environment than their previous placement. Casa Pacifica also provides therapeutic supports for students which include individual and group therapy/counseling. Casa Pacifica subcontracts services for speech, physical and occupational therapy. Casa Pacifica also provides transportation for students at the request of referring districts. Upon acceptance, an Individual Service Agreement (ISA) is generated for each student listing the services and requirements necessary.

IX. Student Performance

Standardized Testing and Reporting Program

The Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program consists of several key components, including the California Standards Tests (CSTs); the California Modified Assessment (CMA), and the California Alternate Performance Assessment (CAPA). The CSTs show how well students are doing in relation to the state content standards. The CSTs include English-language arts (ELA) and mathematics in grades two through eleven; science in grades five, eight, and nine through eleven; and history-social science in grades eight, and ten through eleven. The CAPA includes ELA, mathematics in grades two through eleven, and science for grades five, eight, and ten. The CAPA is given to those students with significant cognitive disabilities whose disabilities prevent them from taking either the CSTs with accommodations or modifications or the CMA with accommodations. The CMA includes ELA for grades three through eight and science in grades five and eight and is an alternate assessment that is based on modified achievement standards. The CMA is designed to assess those students whose disabilities preclude them from achieving grade-level proficiency on an assessment of the California content standards with or without accommodations. Student scores are reported as performance levels. Professional Development

National Assessment of Educational Progress

The National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) is a nationally representative assessment of what America's students know and can do in various subject areas. Assessments are conducted periodically in mathematics, reading, science, writing, the arts, civics, economics, geography, and U.S. history. Student scores for reading and mathematics are reported as performance levels (i.e., basic, proficient, and advanced) and the participation of students with disabilities (SD) and English language learners (ELL) is reported based on three levels (identified, excluded, and assessed). Note: Only a sample group of California's schools and districts participate in the NAEP testing cycle. Therefore, students in any particular school or district may not be included in these results. The NAEP reflects state test results and is not reflective of either the LEA or the individual school. Comparisons of student performance on the NAEP and student performance on the Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program assessments cannot be made without an understanding of the key differences between the two assessment programs. For example, the NAEP only assesses grades four, eight and twelve and for long-term trends assesses grades nine, thirteen, and seventeen. Additionally, the NAEP only provides state test results for grades four and eight. The California Standards Tests (CSTs) are based on a different set of standards than the NAEP assessments. For example, the NAEP is not aligned with California academic content and achievement standards and, therefore, does not necessarily reflect the curriculum and instruction to which students are exposed in the classroom. The NAEP assesses reading and writing separately, while the CSTs assess English-language arts (ELA), encompassing reading as well as writing conventions, spelling, and grammar. Scores on the CSTs and other assessments are not directly comparable to those on NAEP. The averages and percentages presented are estimates based on samples of students rather than on entire populations. Finally, the questions students respond to are only a sample of the knowledge and skills covered by the NAEP frameworks.
