

Bryan Samuels — National Head of Foster Care — Visits Casa Pacifica

Casa Pacifica was pleased to welcome Bryan Samuels, President Obama's appointee to the post of Commissioner of the Administration on Children, Youth, and Families at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services — or, put more simply, the federal head of foster care — to its campus on February 15th. Vicki Murphy, Casa Pacifica's Director of Development & Operations, invited Mr. Samuels when she visited Washington D.C. last October as part of a select panel to discuss emerging trends in foster care and the focus of national policy on the issue.

toward child welfare in his 2012 Budget, but Mr. Samuels has the challenging task of convincing Congress to pass that increase. Casa Pacifica's three Youth Advocates, each a former foster youth, also had the opportunity to meet privately with Mr. Samuels for about an hour. They shared their foster care experiences as well as their first-hand impressions of what policies are working and what could be

reinforced his belief that dedicated people and well-designed programs can make a dramatic impact on the lives of at-risk youth.

Mr. Samuels served as the Chief of Staff for Chicago Public Schools where he held a leadership position managing the day-to-day operations of the third largest school system in the nation. Prior to that role, he served as the Director of the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services, the country's third largest child welfare agency, where he implemented comprehensive assessments of all children entering care, redesigned transitional and independent living programs to better prepare youth for emancipation, created a child location unit to track all runaway youth, and introduced evidenced-based programs to address the impact of trauma and exposure to violence on children in state care.

Mr. Samuels' visit to Casa Pacifica was just one stop on a California trip, which included presenting the keynote address at the California Alliance for Children and Families' annual

improved for transitioning/emancipated foster youth. Mr. Samuels offered some sage advice as to where the youths should direct their efforts in the future.

Casa Pacifica was grateful to be included on Mr. Samuels' itinerary, and to be able to introduce him to Casa Pacifica. Mr. Samuels

later commented that as a snapshot view and without knowing what our outcomes are and based on Casa Pacifica's physical campus, our children seem happy and friendly, and the staff professional, passionate, and dedicated. Casa Pacifica

was proud to host Mr. Samuels for a few hours and to share a dialogue on the direction foster care is heading nationally.

His commitment to public service is largely motivated by his own success in overcoming great personal hardship during his eleven and a half years of growing up in a residential school for disadvantaged children. This experience shaped his commitment to serve children who live in foster care, and

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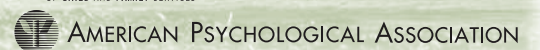

From the Chief Executive Officer

Match Day! It's an exciting day at the end of February when doctoral candidates in psychology from around the country find out where they are going to intern and when organizations offering internships find out who will be in their program. The process begins in the fall when candidates apply for internships that they believe will advance their knowledge and skills. The most highly prized internship programs are those approved by the American Psychological Association (APA), especially those focusing on populations with whom the doctoral candidates hope to work. Casa Pacifica is APA approved and highly sought after for an internship opportunity working with kids and families.

This year more than 170 doctoral candidates from major universities applied to be accepted as one of our five interns. After reviewing their applications we invited 36 to come for a day-long interview (at their own expense!). We ranked 24 of them on

the same national data base used by other participating programs. Likewise, internship candidates rank their internship choices in that data base. The computer program then matched sites to candidates.

Match day is over. The five interns we selected will start in August. One of our new interns comes from a major university "with incredible training opportunities and talented faculty." She chose Casa Pacifica because it gave her the "... chance to work at a place where individuals and families are served with an appreciation for context and community, and where the organization is constantly working to improve." About her interview she said that "I was consistently impressed by the way everyone at Casa Pacifica interacted ... seeing hellos and laughs, watching people hold doors open for one another, and noticing the exchanges between all of the people whose paths we crossed. It's clear that you value one another and love the work you do — even when nobody's watching. Your community ... is the kind that grows through consistent, positive interactions and isn't the kind that is manufactured for a day. It is also the kind of community that helps to sustain an agency when the work is difficult or conflict inevitably occurs."

We see as part of our mission preparing future psychologists and others working with kids and families to be the best they can be. We are proud of our nationally recognized pre-doctoral psychology internship program, the cutting edge training we provide, and the outstanding staff who are committed to quality services. We are most proud, though, of the "match day" that happens between our staff and those they help when relationships heal and kids and families begin rebuilding their lives in healthy ways.

Cloud 9 Store Finds New Home on Campus

With the help of generous donors Sean and Dianna Baker, and a gift from an anonymous friend, Cloud 9 (the campus store where the kids can 'shop') was moved from a small, dark, windowless room in the gymnasium building to a large, light-filled space in a modular building near the school. Dianna Baker, a Cloud 9 volunteer, was so excited about making this change that she convinced her husband they should help finance the move and remodel, as well as help stock the new store with items for the kids to buy. Sean Baker was right on board and even brought in his electronics person to install a flat screen TV that runs special videos all day long. New vinyl flooring that resembles wooden planks and new ceiling tiles immediately gave a fresh, relaxed vibe to the

space, which now offers a "Surf Shack" theme. A special pass through window was installed so that in the future, students will be able to learn about business by running the store for a few hours each week and selling items through the walk-up window. A freestanding counter with reed-covered chairs offers a spot for the kids to sit down and enjoy an ice cream bar or smoothie.

Cloud 9's grand opening was held early in December, and the kids loved it immediately. We are extremely grateful to the Bakers and to our anonymous donor for their generosity, and our children thank them for creating a hip, cool place on campus to hang out.

From the Principal of Casa Pacifica's Nonpublic School – Scott Mastroianni

As I reflect on the past two-and-a-half years since I arrived at Casa Pacifica, I am amazed at the progress the school has made. It would be unfair to take all of the credit, so I would love to take this opportunity to update you on programs that have been implemented, highlight people who have contributed to the turnaround, and share our vision for the future.

The SRA reading program has had profound results for our youth through targeted reading intervention. With the help of teacher Jenny Duncan, students have improved their reading levels in a short amount of time, including a couple of students who jumped three grade levels in one school year. Additionally, we increased our technology focus through the use of laptops, projectors, and access to Apex Learning's online coursework.

The school hired a certified fitness trainer, Missy Andrews, to work with students on group and individual goals regarding health and fitness. Recently, our youth trained for the Great Race of Agoura 5K run, and are working on meeting presidential fitness standards. Jill and Tom Ball continue to grow our music program and each performance exceeds our expectations. And, this year saw the opening of the orientation and intervention room, run by Mark Lybrand and Mary-Lynn Wagner, which provides a welcoming environment for all new students, ensuring a positive, smooth transition into our school.

In the classroom, our teachers have emphasized higher academic standards and focused on quality instruction, including Character-Based Literacy, to help contribute to student learning. Each year our teachers and their support staff strive to reach kids that many schools have given up on. They do this by focusing on relationships and quality instruction. Our behavior support staff is now present in the classrooms allowing them to be more proactive in heading off incidents, which has translated into better results. Whether encouraging our kids to play on our basketball team in the Boys & Girls Club league, participate in the County Science Fair, work an on or off-campus job, attend welding classes at the County's ROP program, take junior college classes while in high school, or prepare kids to pass the High School Exit Exam, our staff has truly embraced the concept that it takes a village to help these students.

In addition, the administrative team of Darlene Garcia, Monica Arambula, and Annie Ellberg helps to make the school's day-to-day operations run smoothly.

We could never do our work without the tremendous support of Dr. Steve Elson and our Board of Directors, the clinical team, the Development office, the health clinic, and all of the programs at Casa Pacifica working together to ensure our kids' ultimate success. This list is not exhaustive and we are very grateful to everyone who has donated time or resources to make our school a success.

So what lies ahead? Continued academic and emotional success is at the forefront of our efforts. We look forward to the addition of a program that will serve at-risk autism students, as well as a fitness center/weight room for children. A mid-term WASC (Western Association Schools & College) accreditation visit is scheduled in the spring. And, we look forward to more kids passing the High School Exit Exam, becoming proficient on state standards, and having positive and successful transitions to the next stage of their lives.

Tax-Saving Opportunity for Donors Aged 70 1/2+

Under the extended charitable IRA legislation, now you can make charitable gifts using funds from your individual retirement accounts (IRAs) without undesirable tax effects.

Previously you would have had to report any amount taken from your IRA as taxable income. You could then take a charitable deduction for the gift, but only up to 50 percent of your adjusted gross income. In effect, this caused some donors to pay more in income taxes than they would have if they hadn't made a gift at all.

Fortunately, now these IRA gifts can be accomplished simply and without tax complications. Plus, you can make the gifts now—while you are living and able to witness the benefits of your generosity. This unique opportunity expires at the end of 2011.

You may contribute funds this way if:

- You are age 70½ or older at the time of the gift.
- The gifts total any amount up to \$100,000 in 2011.
- You transfer funds directly from an IRA.
- You transfer the gifts outright to one or more qualified charities, but not to supporting organizations, or for gift annuities, charitable trusts or donor advised funds.

How the Extended Law Works

Pat, age 80, has \$450,000 in an IRA and has pledged to give Casa Pacifica \$75,000 this year. If Pat transfers \$75,000 to us directly from the IRA, she will avoid paying income tax on that amount. She cannot, however, claim a charitable deduction—it is a pure wash. Pat has found an easy way to benefit Casa Pacifica without tax complications. If Pat's spouse has an IRA and is 70½ or older, he can also give up to \$100,000 tax-free to a charity of his choice.

How to Make a Gift

Contact your IRA custodian soon to transfer your desired gift amount to Casa Pacifica.

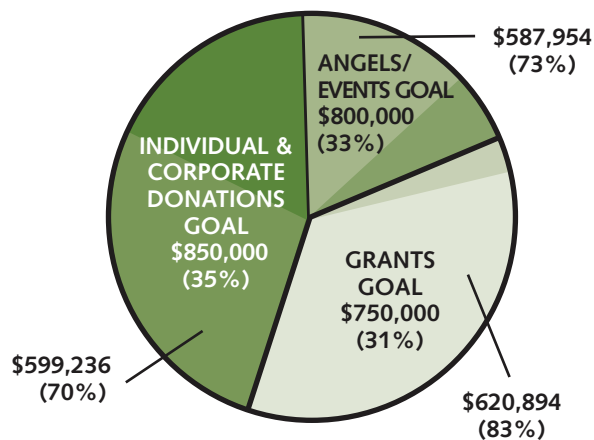

Ms. Miranda shared the moving story of her life growing up in a house plagued with domestic violence, circumstances that lead to her eventual placement at Casa Pacifica. It was her life's path following her stay at Casa Pacifica that brought people to tears, however. A young, single mother at twenty, she was encouraged by Vicki Murphy and Carrie Hughes of Casa Pacifica's Development Department to get a college education as "the ticket to a better life." Cristina began working at Casa Pacifica as a Youth Advocate and was determined to finish college. Now a senior at California State University Channel Islands, she is preparing to take the LSAT and apply to a special USC program that offers a dual degree in law

and social work. Ms. Miranda's speech was a compelling influence on the guests who later bid generously on the Higher Education Scholarships offered in the Live Auction, which alone raised \$49,000 to help foster youth attend college or trade school.

There was a special side story to Ms. Miranda's speech. Dr. Roz Warner, a Casa Pacifica Board of Directors member, is also one of the Women of Jewelia – a group of 13 women who joined together to purchase a stunning diamond necklace (which they named Jewelia), and who take turns each month using the necklace to bring good into the world. Dr. Warner surprised Ms. Miranda at the Angels Ball by placing the elegant strand of diamonds around her neck. Kym Douglas – the beauty expert, make-up artist to the stars, and television personality who is regularly seen on the Ellen DeGeneres Show, skillfully emceed the evening's events. The Live Auction presented unique offerings including a private dinner for ten at Sherwood Country Club; an entertainment package that included tickets to the Emmy Awards Show, The Ellen DeGeneres Show, The Doctors Show, and dinner at the Smoke House in Toluca Lake; a seven-day cruise on Princess Cruise Line; a Labrador Retriever puppy; and a San Diego get-away that included sailing on the America's Cup "Stars & Stripes" yacht, and tickets to the Old Globe Theater. 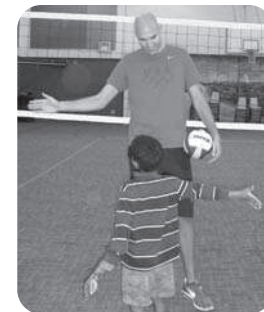
